Bowdon Library to Showcase Valentine Cards For the Carroll County Historical Society Valentine's Day is February 14th.



The Bowdon Library was gracious in allowing the Carroll County Historical Society to display the Valentine's Cards from the Miss. Pearl Lanier Collection. The display is in the main lobby and will



be on exhibit though February. The cards date back to 1918 as students exchanged cards. Another part of the collection is dated 1925, when Miss. Pearl was a teacher at the Center-Point School in Temple. She would later move to the county system. As you visit the exhibit you will notice most cards are embossed at the printer. The cards were printed in America, Germany and one from France. There is one envelope in the collection addressed to *James P. Lanier Temple Georgia* and it was delivered with a two-cent stamp.

VALENTINE'S CARDS FROM THE MISS. PEARL LANIER COLLECTION



The two small cards are printed in Germany. They are perforated to allow you to fold on the edge to make it stand up. The card on the top left is printed in America and is a honeycomb style. The honeycomb style was first popular in Germany, later moving to the American market. The card on the far right is a pop-up style. You will notice the intricate design of the flowers.



The cards above are dated 1918. Miss. Pearl Lanier would have been 15 or 16 years of age. It appears these cards were exchanged by classmates. The cards are embossed and printed in Germany. They are a pop-up style that allows the cards to stand alone. Students signed on the back of the card.



The cards above are dated 1925. Miss. Pearl Lanier would have been 25 years of age. The style leads us to believe these were hand crafted by students in an elementary age class. It is not clear in the picture, though some of the cards are a lattice construction. The paper was the brown tinted paper for learning to write the alphabet.

It was only in England 1861 that an inspired candy-maker named Richard Cadbury thought to sell chocolates for Valentine's Day. He packaged them in heart-shaped boxes decorated with rosebuds and Cupids, which were already popular symbols of romance among the Victorians. Thus, a new Valentine's Day tradition was born.

The Whitman's Sampler box was released in 1912 and went on to become the best-selling Box of chocolates in the US.

Valentine's Day flowers began as a tradition in the 17th century, since roses, which represent love in all its forms, were the flowers of choice for the Day.

The rose is supposed to be the favorite flower of Venus, the Goddess of Love, because it stood for strong feelings. As a result, lovers began giving flowers to those they cared about to show their love for each other, which often knew no bounds.

Miss. Walter Pearl Lanier was born February 10, 1903 to parents James Pleasant Lanier and Ethel Savilla Brooks in Temple Georgia. Siblings include Miss. Troy Lanier, Mary Ruth Lanier Gilbert, Martha Jimmy Lanier Foster and William Thomas Lanier (1898-1898). Miss. Pearl Lanier and family are buried in the historic Asbury Cemetery in Temple Georgia.

Picture It...Carroll County Courthouse 1970's

This is a picture of the Carroll County Courthouse taken early 1970. Dixie Street on the left of the courthouse has always been a busy street. The second building up from the intersection on the left is the then Carrollton Federal Savings and Loan. You can see the eagle or phoenix sign. The next building up has been torn down to enlarge the parking lot for the bank. The building at the top right is the Lex Villa building which was torn down in 2010 to make room for the Justice Center beside the courthouse. The building on the right of the courthouse was also removed to make room for the Justice Center. The courthouse in the 1970's was where everyone purchased their auto tag. The area behind the courthouse was the only parking lot. You can imagine the crowd as the April deadline neared. At the bottom center is the rooftop of the Carroll Realty and Insurance Company.
