Valentine Display

The Villa Rica Public Library will display the vintage Valentine Cards from the Pearl Lanier Collection for the month of February.

The cards date back to 1918 when Miss. Pearl Lanier was a student. In 1925, Miss. Pearl would become a teacher at the Center Point School in Temple. Some of the cards are from her students to the teacher. The lattice cards in the shape of hearts were hand made by the students.

Germany was the first to begin embossing the images on Valentine cards. Germany also implemented the honeycomb theme cards. Later they would be printed in America.

Richard Cadbury, a candy maker in 1861 England came up with the idea to package small chocolate candies in heart shape boxes. The idea was embraced and would become a world wide trend. The Whitman's Sampler box was released in 1912 in America and went on to become the best selling box of chocolates in the United States.

Presenting roses on Valentine's Day began in the 17th century. The legend has it that the rose was the favorite flower of Venus, the Goddess Love because they stood for strong feelings.

Surprisingly, jewelry and diamonds specifically as a Valentine's Day gift is a very new idea. It started in the 20th century with DeBeers Jewelry Company who began associating giving diamonds with the act of love.

It wasn't until the 1980's when we saw mass advertising of diamonds for Valentine's Day. Despite only being a thirty somethingyear tradition, today diamond jewelry remains a major player for Valentine's day spending.



Bowdon Native Publishes Magazine

Otis Bryant Copeland, PhD. was a member of The Progressive Farmer Company Board of Directors who launched Southern Living magazine 56 years ago. Dr. Copeland was also the first editor of Southern Living. The debut was February 1966.

His career with The Progressive Farmer/ Southern



Progress Corporation spanned 25 years. He began as an Assistant Editor of the farm magazine and became a company vice president and Director in 1970. He would retire in 1982.

Active in journalism and civic affairs, Copeland served as president of the Alabama Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalist, and won a national award for programs during his term in office.

Dr. Copeland earned Bachelors and Masters Degrees from the University of Georgia. He was awarded a PhD from the University of Wisconsin. He was for 12 years the State Agricultural Extension Service Editor at the University of Georgia. He became a charter member of the University President's Club, a charter member of the College of Journalism Advisory Committee, and was a visiting professor at the University following his retirement.



He was the author of two books: Memories That Mirror 85 Fortunate Years, and Letters from a Model-T Dad to his Space-Age Sons.

Dr. Copeland who lived in the Birmingham area for 47 years, died Wednesday, December 21, 2005.

He married his high school sweetheart, the for-

mer Miss. Dorothy Causey of the Victory community of Bowdon on September 29, 1940. Mrs. Dot Copeland is the daughter of Eugene Causey (born 21 Oct. 1888—died 27 Jan. 1979) and Ada Bartlett (born 13 Jun. 1887 - died 20 Feb. 1984) They have two sons, Barry Copeland and Eugene Copeland.

Dr. O.B. Copeland was the son of Joseph Bryant Copeland (born 17 Feb. 1884 -died 26 Oct. 1958) and Annie Lee Jackson (born 10 Sep. 1884 died 27 Dec. 1964). His siblings include; brothers, James Millard Copeland and Jimmy Bryant Copeland sisters, Bessie Lee Copeland Nixon, and Reba Celestial Copeland Lancaster.

Dr. O. B. Copeland's ancestorial line traces back to Charles McDaniel, the founder of Bowdon College.
