Brooks—Cown Families of Temple GA.

Dr. James Fletcher Brooks was one of the first doctors in Temple Georgia. He would travel by horse to visit patients. Dr. J.F. Brooks also operated one of the first drug stores in Temple, Brooks and Rowe Drugstore.

Dr. James F. Brooks was born April 23, 1853 in Carroll County to William Brooks III and Catherine Matilda Clontz. William Brooks, III was a Methodist minister and preached at Asbury Methodist Church off Rainey Road across from Asbury Cemetery. Rev. Brooks also preached at Concord Methodist Church at Hickory Level, which is the oldest church in Carroll County.

James's siblings include twin girls, Mary I. Brooks, (1834); Sarah E. Brooks, (1834); Catherine M. Brooks, (1837); Janie E. Brooks, (1839); John Wesley Brooks, (1841); William J. Brooks, (1843); Lugeri F. Brooks, (1847); and Thomas S. Brooks, (1850).

After the death of Dr. J.F. Brooks' first wife Ida Ann Rowe, he married Gaudie L. Bayne, daughter of Judge H.V. Bayne of Atlanta. The Brooks lived in a house at the corner of Tallapoosa St. and Montgomery St. in Temple.

James and Ida had a son, William Lewis Brooks and a daughter, Ida Fletcher Brooks.

Ida R. Brooks passed away February 16, 1889, two weeks after giving birth to their daughter Ida F. Brooks who only lived one day.

Dr. J.F. Brooks graduated from the Atlanta Medical College in 1879 and practiced in Temple Georgia.

Dr. Brooks contributed much toward the early development of Temple. He donated the land to build the Temple United Methodist Church in 1884.

Dr. Brooks died July 31, 1893. William Lewis was 12 years old at his father's death. Uncle John Wesley Brooks would be appointed the legal guardian of William Lewis Brooks.

John Wesley Brooks married Cynthia Elvira Allen, daughter of Alcimus Harris Allen of Hickory Level community.

They had six children: Mary Jane Brooks, Margaret Katie Lee Brooks, William Harris Brooks, Mary Lee Brooks, Vivian Magdalene Brooks, Virginia Harris Brooks, John Fletcher Brooks, Annie Luda Brooks and Mattie Lucy Brooks. Mattie Lucy Brooks was born February 6, 1889 in Carroll County and died September 21, 1976 in Temple GA.

Most of the Brooks family is buried in the Asbury Cemetery in Temple.

Miss. Brooks married Samuel Mark Cown of Walton County GA. in 1915. They had three children: John Mark Cown (1917-1998), William Brock Cown (1922-1989) and Samuel Wesley Cown (1927-1927)

John M. Cown served in the U.S. Air Force, Marine Scout Bombing Squadron, One Fifty-One, Marine Aircraft Group Thirteen Fourth Marine Bare Defense Aircraft Wing Uvea Island, Wallis Island and in Canada during WWII. He was employed by Graybar Electric for 36 1/2 as a Production Service manager.



William Brock Cown, a Captain in U.S. Army and graduated from Georgia Technical College. Mr. Cown served as a Research Engineer at Georgia Tech Experiment Station.

Samuel Mark Cown was the first County Agent in the State of Georgia. His appointment was to Carroll County in 1906 where he met and married Mattie Lucy Brooks. He visited farmers with his horse and buggy. He was the father of John Mark Cown, William B. Cown and Samuel Wesley Cown.
